What to bring: filing fee and notice of candidacy form.

- Filing fee. The filing fee is 1% of the annual salary of the office sought.⁵
 - In lieu of filing fee: Candidates may avoid payment of the filing fee by submission of a petition signed by registered voters.⁶ Please see the fact sheet "<u>Filing Petition in lieu of Filing Fee</u>" located on the petition page of this agency's website: <u>https://www.ncsbe.gov/petition-info</u>
- Notice of Candidacy⁷:
 - The notice of candidacy form will be made available no earlier than two weeks prior to the filing period. Filings submitted prior to the filing period will not be accepted.
 - The form includes a certificate that must be signed by the chair of the board of elections or the director of elections of the county in which the candidate is registered to vote, stating that the candidate is registered to vote in that county. (See "<u>First Step</u>" above.)
 - The notice of candidacy shall be signed by the candidate either in the presence of the chair or of the secretary of the State Board, or it shall be signed and acknowledged before an officer authorized to take acknowledgements who shall certify the notice under seal.
 - A candidate must be a registered voter affiliated with the same political party with which he or she intends to file. A person changing party affiliation must do so more than **90** days prior to the date the candidate files.⁸
 - The candidate shall indicate on the notice of candidacy form his or her political affiliation.⁹ The party designation shall be included on the ballot."
 - With respect to United States Senate offices for which there are two vacancies, a written statement designating the vacancy to which the candidate seeks election shall be included.¹⁰

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 Felony record.¹¹ The notice of candidacy form includes questions about any previous felony convictions of the candidate; if the candidate has any convictions, additional information is required on a separate form within 48 hours of submitting the notice of candidacy. Active felons who have not had their citizenship rights fully restored, (restoration occurs automatically upon completion of any felony sentence, including any periods of probation or parole), are not eligible to register to vote or run for elected office.

Where do candidates for U.S. House or U.S. Senate file?

- Office of the State Board of Elections, 3rd floor of Dobbs Building, 430 N. Salisbury St., Raleigh, NC
- Parking: visitors may park in Dec #75, a block south of the Dobbs Building on Salisbury Street. Drivers passing the Dobbs Building (gray building on the left as one heads south on Salisbury Street from Peace Street) will note the State Capitol Police office building on the right, after which is an historic red brick building. The parking deck is immediately after the red brick building.

Method of delivery. There are options:

- In person: Candidates are welcome to file in person (a notary will be provided by State Board staff) or have their notarized filing presented by a surrogate at the State Board; or
- By mail: Candidates may have their fee and notarized notice of candidacy sent to the State Board via commercial courier or United States Postal Service.
 - NOTE: Any United States Postal Service mail that is addressed to our physical address is automatically diverted to our post office address, which builds in a delay on receipt. For this reason, candidates are encouraged to use the mailing, rather than the <u>physical office address</u> when using United State Postal Services.
 - State Board of Elections mailing address: P O BOX 27255, Raleigh, NC 27611-7255.
- Notice of candidacy and filing fee must be <u>received</u> at the State Board offices before the filing deadline regardless of the time a mailed filing was deposited or postmarked. If a notice of candidacy and filing fee are not received at the State Board offices by the filing deadline, the candidate has missed the opportunity to file.

Candidates for Congress should contact the Federal Election Commission (FEC) for requirements for registering a campaign finance committee. The FEC has a toll-free phone number, 1-800-424-9530 and a website: <u>www.fec.gov</u> . Candidates for Congress need not register a campaign finance committee with the North Carolina State Board of Elections unless they intend to contribute to other North Carolina candidates.
